As members of Grammy nominated Los Pleneros de la 21, Alma Moyó, Ilú Ayé and the Grammy nominated Los Pleneros de la 21, they are regarded as some of the most versatile and premiere drummers, educators and dancers of Puerto Rican Bomba of their generation. Together, they bring over 50 years' experience as practitioners of Bomba and Plena.



This dance workshop combines stretching, ice-breaker dance sequences, focused exercises that explore movement vocabulary, dance techniques and formations of Puerto Rican Bomba. Suitable for all levels. Live drumming and singing included. Ladies are encouraged to bring floor length dance skirts.

Bomba is regarded as the oldest musical genres of the Caribbean originating from 17th century slaves who used the music as political and spiritual expression. It connects directly to the enslaved African experience on the island of Puerto Rico, and shares roots with Cuba's Tumba Francesa, the Dominican Republic's Sarandunga, Haiti's Compa and countless other Big Drum traditions of the Afro-Diaspora. Puerto Rico's Bomba captures the resilience and collective memory of a community. It is characterized by its improvised dances that convey the spirit, prowess and narratives of the dancers...all of which are interpreted by the drums. Dozens of rhythms mix a sense of sadness and frustration with a desire for celebration and freedom—still relevant today.

Ever since the endow-ments were created in 1965, they have been a focus of ire for defend-ers of fiscal prudence and high cul-tural standards. In the 1980s, the chief complaint was against the efflorescence of ob-scenity and leftish political postur-ing; the pornographic photographs of Robert Mapplethorpe or the an-tics of "performance artist" Karen Finley, who pranced about naked shiring about patriarchy and capiskirling about patriarchy and capitalism.

A \$10,000 grant for theater 'celebrating the saguaro cactus'? The National Endowment said yes.

But "Ten Good Reasons to Eliminate Funding for the National Endow-ment for the Arts," a 1997 Heritage Foundation report, got to the nub of the issue. The NEA is "welfare for cultural elitists," Heritage observed. and the same can be said for the NEH. There is nothing wrong with cultural elitists per se, but why should the taxpayers pick up their tab?

A new report from the Illinoisbased initiative Open the Books provides an eye-opening look into the size of that tab. The study includes virtually every grant the NEA and NEH have made since 2016, and additional details about the endowments' activities as far back as 2009. This includes grants to 71 entities with assets over \$1 billion, and one grant to a California enterprise that celebrates the work of a Japanese-American artist best known for declaring: T consider Osama bin Laden as one of the people that I admire."

Since its founding in 2011, Open the Books has pursued the elusive goal of governmental transparency by collecting reams of data about local, state and federal expenditures. All that information is then made freely accessible online. Their motto: "Every Dime. Online. In Real Time.

The group's earlier initiatives in-clude reports on federal payments to so-called sanctuary cities (\$26.74 bil-lion in 2016) and the eight superrich her farme university of the superrich Ivon in 2016) and the eight supervice Ivy League universities (nearly \$42 billion in federal payments, benefits, billion in reteral payments, benetits, and tax advantages over the last sev-eral years). Harvard alone sits atop an endowment of \$36 billion, and al-together the Ivy League controls taxexempt endowment funds of some \$120 billion, equivalent to \$2 million per undergraduate. Yet taxpayers are footing the bill for massive subsidies for these institutions, where the cost attendance now approaches \$70,000 per annum.

The latest Open the Books report reveals that in 2016 federal arts agencies dispensed more than \$440 million into the collective maw of their clients. Nearly half, \$210 mil-lion, went to recipients in only 10 states—a predictable lineup of pro-gressive coastal outfits, mostly cluss. gressive coastal outfits, mostly clus-

gressive coastal outrits, mostly cus-tered in California and New York. The Metropolitan Museum of Art is a public charity commanding as-sets worth nearly \$4 billion. The museum's annual gala is a star-studded event, what one publicist called an "ATM for the Met." The Met raised some \$300 million last year, yet it has received more than \$1 million from the NEH since 2009. Why?

There is also the issue of what public funds are being spent to support. Doubtless many initiatives could be worthy, but a lot of the funded projects are inane, repellent or both.

In the inane category, consider a \$10,000 grant in 2016 to Borderlands Theater in Tucson, Ariz. The money went to a series of "site-responsive performances celebrating the sa-guaro cactus." Yep, you read that right. Attendees stand or sit with a saguaro cactus for an hour in the middle of the desert to discover what the cactus can teach them. Then they share their experiences on social media. #IFellAsleep?

Many projects are repellent, including several that cannot be described in a family newspaper. But how about this? The New York Shakespeare Festival has been much in the public eye this summer for its production of "Julius Caesar," in which the title character is made to look like the president. One Associated Press report describes the carnage: "He looks like Donald Trump ... moves like Trump ... is knifed to death on stage, blood staining his



Kimi rebutted with a letter to the editor (below). She also wrote an op-ed for **High Country News** (August 23, 2017): "How many golf trips is public funding for the arts worth?" Kimi writes: "The saguaro offered a portal to the many stories of a community. Stories from scientists, culture-bearers, artists and others about the cactus were broadcast on a radio program, The Saguaro Minute, reaching 30,000 local listeners and three times that online. Those stories were also woven into theater pieces performed live in the park. Though the stories focused on the non-human, they illuminated many truths about our humanity — what awes us, what we fear and cherish, how we give and grieve and heal." Read the entire article here:


# The Public Value in the NEA Saguaro Project

Roger Kimball's critique of the National Endowment for the Arts, which includes a jab at a project involving the saguaro cactus, didn't surprise me (July 11: "It Costs Taxpayers a Bundle, but Is It Art?"). Perfunctory digs on such work will always be a conservative pastime. But had Mr. Kimball bothered to investigate the "inane" saguaro project, which I directed, he might have discovered the depth of its public value.

To carry out the yearlong project commemorating the National Park Service Centennial with a specific focus on Saguaro National Park, I leveraged \$10,000 from the NEA to raise additional public and private funds. The work's introductory act, which Mr. Kimball derides, invited people to stand with a saguaro (for up to an hour). Nearly 300 people did that, reporting experiences of connectedness, resilience and peace. The project also featured radio interviews with scientists, culture bearers and others, reaching 30,000 local listeners and three times that online. It shared the annual saguaro fruit harvesting tradition, commemorated the National Park Service's 100th birthday with a formal dance at dawn, and culminated with a play based on history, tradition and reverence for the cactus. No one fell asleep.

Perhaps Mr. Kimball might suggest fewer presidential trips to Mar-a-Lago as a way to trim government spending: 40 of them will cost taxpayers the equivalent of the 2018 NEA allocation, just approved by the House.
