



[nueBOX] presents Daughter of the Deer, a performance created by former members of Orange Theatre - a collaboration between Stephen Christensen, Katrina Donaldson, Joya Scott, & Matthew Watkins, through a Studio/LAB Residency. This performance is an original work of dance-theatre for solo performer, video, and sound, exploring the media construction of female identity and authenticity in the wake of #MeToo. We are thinking about who is trustworthy and which experiences are



acceptable. About the distance between victim and perpetrator. About Asia Argento. About sanity, insanity, and being trapped between the two. About Medea and Andrea Yates, who drowned their children. About witch trials. We're thinking about Christine Blasey Ford and Anita Hill, and who gets a fair shake. Building off the work done by documentary filmmaker, Trinh T. Minh-ha, to outline the aesthetic code of "objectivity," our piece visually explores the subtle language that communicates who and what we're supposed to believe. In the process, it uncovers the troubled relationship between art and journalism and questions whether either can ever really tell the truth. *Pay what you can at the door.*

Michael Crotty ~ Opposing Points is an Advanced Technique class addressing the notions of opposition acting within and against the forces of the body. This course draws upon sound anatomical principles to enable the dancers to call upon simple directional cues related to up/down, forward/back and side/side. The result is a clarified approach to complex vocabulary that enables the body to move with ease and excitement.

Shelly Hawkins ~ With the dynamics of jazz dance and the weight and swing of modern dance, we will discover powerful movement and hone our musicality. We will focus on pelvis driven movement that informs the spine and head. We will seek a sense of lift and freedom in the upper body while finding connectivity to the floor in the lower body, and use rhythmic coordination to help dancers feel dynamics and suspension in their movement. We will move in and out of the floor, use guided improvisations to open up our bodies and access hidden movement potential, and make meaty movement phrases to sick beats.

NobleMotionDance ~ This is an advanced level contemporary class that emphasizes aggressive full-bodied movement. Both athletic and sumptuous, exercises delve into concepts of recycling energy, transitional flow, "use of weight", and dynamic range. The overall class encourages risk taking discovered through spatially challenging and complex phrase work.



Suzanne Beahrs

This class begins with standing warm ups that include moving in and out of the floor, progresses to guided improvisations structured around technical concepts, and then we dance bite-sized dances that accumulate into a final phrase. My class is influenced by my training in release technique, classical and contemporary modern dance styles, ballet, and Counter technique. I am interested in providing opportunities for: a healthful, rigorous practice; refining specificity and movement potential via repetition and awareness; and making personal choices through improvisation and nuanced execution. I value full-bodied movement, efficiency, clarity, locomotion, groundedness, expression, strength, sensuality, and availability, BUT in order to achieve these things we will first use class as a setting to translate these beautiful objectives into a series of simple tasks that help us cultivate them. We practice from wherever we are each day and go from there.







The Creative Process: Choreography, Choice-Making and
Communication

NDEO's 2019 Conference will be held at the Hyatt Regency Miami (Florida) October 23-26, Wednesday-Saturday. Submit a Paper Presentation, a Movement Session, an Experiential Workshop, or a Panel Presentation! Online submission information *here*.

You are invited to consider the multiple facets of the creative process when devising your proposal. Some questions to consider as you put together your proposal:

- What impacts the choices one makes as a creator, performer, or educator? How can these roles interplay in one's professional career?
- As a choreographer how do you engage dancers in a process that addresses issues of gender, culture, socio-economic status, and challenges or concerns in today's ever-changing communities? How do we encourage inclusivity in the creative and performative processes, especially in dance forms where participation has traditionally been limited to dancers who fit a certain aesthetic?
- As an educator, how can you inform, guide and mentor students to develop their own personal creative processes as they take the next steps in their careers and in their lives? How do we make the creative process safe and developmentally appropriate for all participants? How do we encourage growth mindset, critical thinking, personal empowerment, and community engagement through the creative and performative processes?
- How do we embrace our complicated and at times challenging societal and dance histories through the teaching and restaging of masterworks?
- In what ways can dance be utilized as a vehicle for communicating, expressing emotions, telling stories, conveying information, and igniting passions in both performers and audience members? How do we, as a dance community, become more unified, more connected, and provide shared resources that can be of service to the dance commonwealth? In what ways can we reach beyond our own dance community to serve as an advocate and voice in the larger global arena?

NDEO CALL FOR PROPOSALS due March 1, 2019

JAZZ DANCE: Hybrids, Fusions, Connections, Community will bring together a community of jazz artists, educators, and practitioners to share and deepen their understanding of what jazz dance is today, in all its vibrant shapes and forms, and how it might continue to evolve. Presented at the annual conference in Salve Regina University, Newport, Rhode Island | Tuesday, July 30-Friday, August 2, 2019

Stay after conference and catch the world famous Newport Jazz Festival. The event encompasses 3 full days of music 8/2-8/4 at Fort Adams State Park. Please note that admission to the festival is separate and is not included in conference registration.

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Hybrids, Fusions: Jazz dance is a fusion at its core, expressed in multiple ways. What styles and aesthetics fuse together in your signature jazz style and how do you trace your jazz lineage? Do you see the African roots in today's jazz dance practices, and how do you teach jazz in a way that honors its origins? How do globalization, technology, and social media inspire new hybrids and fusions that are rooted in jazz dance?

Connections: How do you connect to authentic jazz dance in your teaching or choreography? Does your jazz practice unite diverse populations or serve your community in a unique way? In what ways do you connect to music? How does jazz connect to race, racism, gender, age? How do you build relationships across sectors, ages, cultures? How do jazz styles relate to the way they are performed (e.g. competitively, socially, recreationally, etc.)? Do you engage in or utilize research in your practice?

Community: How do you build community in your jazz classes? Do you have an innovative way of using jazz to engage, inspire, or effect change in your community? In what ways do you interact with colleagues to advance jazz dance in your teaching environment and your community? What is the position of jazz dance in your place of employment, and how do you advocate for jazz dance?

Conference sessions may include Movement Sessions (60 minutes)

Paper Presentations (20 minutes with 10 minutes Q&A)

Panels (60 minutes; 3-5 panelists)

Jam Sessions (20 minutes) - Explore ideas. Jams might explore a warm-up exercise, a brief across the floor combination, or a community building activity.

Choreography as Community (90 minutes) - Explore movement ideas/phrases with conference participants; to be performed informally at the conference's conclusion. You may only submit one proposal as Lead Presenter; you may be co-presenter on additional presentations.



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Three New Year's Resolutions for Dance Teachers

It's resolution time, dance teachers! Whether you love the practice of making New Year's resolutions or hate it, the changing of the calendar can be a great time for us to reflect on our teaching practices and set some goals for the next twelve months and beyond. Here are three practical New Year's Resolutions every dance teacher should make for 2019:

1) I will teach purposefully and 'planfully'

I will admit that occasionally I approach teaching like another day at the office. Years of experience and education allow me to "wing it" fairly well when necessary, but it never feels great to teach without a lesson plan supporting the work. When I have a strong lesson plan, supported by a curriculum for the entire year, I know that I am making the best use of my students' time (and my own!) and helping them progress toward their goals. Teaching from a lesson plan allows for purposeful teaching, guiding students not only in dance technique, but in critical life skills

such as grit, responsibility, communication, creativity, and empathy.

Do you want support for creating holistic curricular goals and lesson plans quickly and efficiently? 2) I will fill my own cup regularly

Teaching is an act of generosity. As educators, we give everything we have to our students. Even though we love what we do, there is no denying that the hours can be tough, the planning and administration can be difficult, and the job

takes it toll physically and emotionally. This year allow yourself time on a regular basis to *take care of yourself* so that you can take care of your students. Find practices that excite, inspire, and rejuvenate you! Take a dance class for yourself, read inspirational or educational books, invest in professional development, or engage in non-dance hobbies to give yourself a break from the #danceteacherlife. Prioritizing self-care can help prevent burnout and allow you to give 100% in the studio.

3) I will support, and find support in, the dance community

For all of the time spent in front of others in the studio, being a dance teacher can still feel isolating. We may be the only dance specialist at our school, or perhaps the studio schedule doesn't allow for 19 Arizona Dance e-Star


much interaction with our fellow teachers. Doesn't it often feel like we are ships passing in the night? It's difficult for non-dancers to understand the passion, joy, and frustration that come with our chosen career. At the same time, making our living in the dance studio sometimes means that the last thing we want to do at the end of the week is even think about dance. But it is important that we allow ourselves to support, and be supported by, the dance community.

Connect with other dancers and dance teachers, either through social media groups or dance service organizations (such as the National Dance Education Organization or Dance/USA). Show your

support for local dance by attending dance concerts whenever possible: local touring groups, college dance concerts, other studios' recitals. Encourage your students to connect with other local dancers to build a base of support for themselves and to raise awareness of dance in your community.



INSPIRATION FOR 2019 CHOREOGRAPHY CENTURION NAT 'KING' COLE

March 17, 1919-February 15, 1965 (died of lung cancer at 45)
Nat 'King' Cole was a world-renowned singer and pianist
(although he was 'forced' to sing his first time by a patron and restaurant owner or he'd lose his gig!). His mother was his only music teacher and he played Yes, We Have No Bananas on a piano at age 4. He married Nadine Robinson, a dance, and

divorced in 1946. He became famous for his 'drummerless' trio; drummer failed to show and the Nat Cole Trio was born. Needing money, he sold he rights to *Straighten Up and Fly Right* (1943 - 1st vocal hit) for \$50. 'Nature Boy' was a Side B hit that helped him rise to fame. Cole was the first African American to launched a television show (premiered 5 Nov 1956 NBC) that drew tremendous ratings and reviews, but closed in 1957 after 64 weeks because national advertisers would not then back a Negro, he said. [L.A. Times, Feb 16, 1965]. All his songs are danceable, and these are just some of his best: *Sunny Side of the Street, Sweet Lorraine, Nature Boy, L.O.V.E., Calypso Blues, Frosty the Snowman, Walkin' My Baby Back Home, Unforgettable, Orange Colored Sky, (Get Your Kicks On) Route 66, Mona Lisa, Send For Me, (I Love You) For Sentimental Reasons, Darling, Je Vous Aime Beaucoup.*

Here's Cole's "*The Christmas Song*" (1961), a classic written by Mel Torme and Bob Wells in 1944 first recorded by The King Cole Trio in 1946.


