AZ ARTS CONGRESS was early this year. I met with my two new LD#3 representatives and they are young and full of energy to do what is right for AZ. They represent the largest arts district in Tucson where I live — downtown (pg 16). On January 30, the AZ Senate Education Committee gave the 'Do Pass' recommendation (8/0) to the Senate Rules Committee to move forward with the proposed bill (SB1111) to create a 'Fine Arts Seal' for high school diplomas introduced by Senator Paul Boyer (R, LD#20, No PHX), Chair of the AZ House Education Committee. As this bill moves forward through the Senate, then House, we ask that all of you stay engaged and connect with your legislators to support this bill. Thank you to Rusty Foley, Executive Director, AZ Citizens for the Arts, who keeps us connected.

Thank you to everyone who attended ADC's Annual Meeting held in Tucson for the first time. We hung out at the 'bar!' See pictures on pg13, and *thank you's* on pg 14. Members travelled from Prescott, Phoenix and Willcox to hear our speakers and connect in person. It was 75 degrees and we were HOT! The sunshades at Westbound | MSA ANNEX were perfect. Ballet Arizona dancer *Mimi Tompkins* graces our cover with photo by *Tim Fuller*. What a stunning *Firebird* she makes. And the



- What impacts the choices one makes as a creator, performer, or educator? How can these roles interplay in one's professional career?
- As a choreographer how do you engage dancers in a process that addresses issues of gender, culture, socio-economic status, and challenges or concerns in today's ever-changing communities? How do we encourage inclusivity in the creative and performative processes, especially in dance forms where participation has traditionally been limited to dancers who fit a certain aesthetic?
- As an educator, how can you inform, guide and mentor students to develop their own personal creative processes as they take the next steps in their careers and in their lives? How do we make the creative process safe and developmentally appropriate for all participants? How do we encourage growth mindset, critical thinking, personal empowerment, and community engagement through the creative and performative processes?
- How do we embrace our complicated and at times challenging societal and dance histories through the teaching and restaging of masterworks?
- In what ways can dance be utilized as a vehicle for communicating, expressing emotions, telling stories, conveying information, and igniting passions in both performers and audience members? How do we, as a dance community, become more unified, more connected, and provide shared resources that can be of service to the dance commonwealth? In what ways can we reach beyond our own dance community to serve as an advocate and voice in the larger global arena?



EIGHT LIFE SKILLS LEARNED THROUGH DANCE

Shannon Dooling-Cain is a member of the Arizona Dance Coalition and a dance professional: educator, choreographer, performer, and writer, living in Vail (SE Tucson). From the perspective of a dance educator, here is her most recent blog post on eight life skills we learn by taking dance classes and performing.

As dancers, we know that what we've learned in the studio goes far beyond the steps and choreography. We know from our own experience that dance can be transformative; that it helps

us grow not only as movers and artists, but as individuals and citizens. Dance training instills all kinds of life skills, but so often dance is dismissed as fluffy, frivolous, or merely something to do for fun.

So the next time someone tries to tell you that you are "just" a dancer (or "just" a dance teacher!), remind them that there is no such thing as "just" when it comes to dance! Through dance education, valuable skills are developed and refined – skills that have applications extending far beyond the dance studio. Dance training truly is life training, and the skills developed through dance can be applied throughout your life.

Accountability

As a dancer, you are part of a team working together to present the best possible performance. Whether you are a member of the

corps or the chorus, the prima ballerina or the leading man, a swing or an understudy, you are vital to the success of the production. If you skip rehearsal, phone it in, forget your entrance, or don't give it all in every run through, the entire team suffers. You learn quickly that others rely on you, and you are accountable to fulfill your role with humility and hard work.

Personal Responsibility

A lot more goes into dance class than one might realize. You need to remember your dancewear and shoes, arrive on time, warm yourself up, remember combinations and choreography, apply corrections from the instructor, follow proper etiquette, and interact with your fellow dancers safely and appropriately. Your dance teachers are there to guide and advise you, but

ultimately, it is up to you to set and meet your personal goals. As a dance student, you will quickly learn that you are responsible for your own success in the studio, and you become empowered to make that success as reality.

Persistence

Dancing is *hard*. You have to work at it; spending hours in the studio perfecting your craft. You must practice simple and mundane elements over and over again before you can move on to the more exciting tricks and choreography. If you try to take shortcuts to success, you will quickly learn that it only leads to frustration, disappointment, or injury. *Persistence is the name of the game in dance training!*

Cooperation

Even though you spend a lot of time honing your individual skills in the studio, dancing is most often a group activity. In class, you share the space, using your spatial awareness and non-verbal communication skills to make sure you move safely and allow others to do the same. In rehearsal, you often collaborate with others, working together as a group and with the choreographer to create, manipulate, and embody the artistic vision. In performance, you dance with your partner or ensemble, working to create a sense of unity on stage. While legendary stories about famous performers' egos abound, the truth is most dancers learn quickly that cooperation is key to their own success in the industry.

Creativity

We live in a creative economy. The ability to innovate, think outside the box, and approach problems in creative ways is valued in every field— now more than ever. Dance allows for creativity on multiple levels, whether it is personal self-expression through improvisation, creating your own choreography, or embodying another's choreographic vision as a dancer. Steve Jobs even credits his creative successes in part to his experience with modern dance, stating, "I didn't realize how much I learned about movement and perception from the class until a few years later, when I worked at Atari. I was able to relate how much resolution of movement you need in terms of perceiving things in certain ways for video games."

The emotional, social, and cognitive flexibilities needed to be a dancer are almost more important than the physical.

Flexibility

Obviously, as a dancer you need to be physically flexible. But dancers need to be flexible in other ways, as well. You need to adapt when changes in the choreography are made right up until opening night. You need to be able to balance the viewpoints of different teachers, who might teach the same technique in radically different ways. You need to be able to handle disappointment and frustration with grace. The emotional, social, and cognitive flexibilities needed to be a dancer are almost more important than the physical.

Attention to Detail

Dance is all about the details. The initiation of a movement, the tilt of the head in *epaulment*, and split second adjutants in timing all play a pivotal role in successful execution of dance technique and choreography. As a dancer, you are trained to observe with your eyes, ears, and kinesthetic sense. You learn to pick up the rhythmic patterns in your teacher's voice. You learn to spot minuscule

changes in height of a leg or the angle of an arm. You learn to feel the minute weight changes that make all the difference between a good balance and a great one.

Passion

If there is one word NOT to use to describe a dancer, it is *apathetic*. As a dancer, you care passionately about your art. You sacrifice for it. You devote time, energy, resources —everything you've got. You are inspired, and you strive to inspire others. *Isn't passion what the world needs most right now?* The problems facing societies around the world require passionate individuals who know what it means to devote themselves to a cause. And dancers, in my opinion, do that better than anyone else!

Rusty Cline has danced, competed and attended more than 60 festivals and 4 trips to Buenos Aires, the vast experience of this master teacher is remarkable and varied. He has worked with more than 120 top level tango masters, 15 of which were world champion dancers. Joanne studied with Rusty, they partnered in dance, then they partners in life and were married during one of the Tucson Tango Festivals! Her focused study of

the tango, learning from masters, and practice/performance, have made a positive impact on the inherent stiffness generated by a scoliosis surgery rod implant in her spine at a young age. To her surprise she is now doing moves with her body that she thought would never be part of her repertoire. The lesson Joanne has learned from this personal experience is that dance is a possibility in most anyone's life, regardless of age or physical abilities.



Glykeria Manis ~ Glykeria has a Master's in Dance & Movement Therapy and teaches regularly in Portland, Oregon. Trained in NYC and Buenos Aires, she's been dancing and teaching Argentine Tango for over a decade. As an outgrowth of her training, she became aware of tango not only as an art form and social dance, but also as a vehicle to explore non-verbal communication that increases attunement to ourselves and to others. She infuses her teaching and dancing with somatic awareness, emphasizing balance, elegance, solid technique and creativity.

Kathleen Sinclair and Jon Cristofori, co-owners, met at Jacob's Pillow Summer Dance Festival in 1974 and it was 'love at first sight.' They always tried to work together, but opened their own ballet studio and company in 1992 when they found themselves 'unemployed.' Both teach although Jon is semi-retired and teaches three classes per week. Kathleen does all the bookkeeping



and marketing. In the early years when the boys were home, Kathleen did most business things while Jon stayed home and chauffeured. Now both do the cooking and cleaning depending on the other's schedule for the day. They've been in business together since they met, but for their own business, its been 26 years!





KEEPING YOUR COSTUMES FRESH

Dance costumes ARE NOT street clothes, and should not be laundered after every performance. Many stage costumes are NEVER laundered, but they are simply aired out and perfumed! Here are some tips:

Many glitzy fabrics used today in performance costumes, in fact — ARE NOT launderable. "Magic Dot" or "Night Reflections" can easily lose their dots during cleaning. Hologram and foil surface-prints on spandex (such as 'Mystique'®) cannot be dry-cleaned. Water washing can also diminish the integrity of these fabrics. These fabrics were not meant to last for many years. They were meant to look good for a short time. Perspiration and deodorants also affect these fabrics, by loosening the dots, discoloring the prints, or by eliminating the holographic effects. Hair spray and body oils can ruin these fabrics (if they directly get onto the sequins), as well as any sequins on your costume — so beware of these products when using them when you are wearing your costume.

Feathers cannot be dry cleaned. They would need to be removed from your costume.

NEVER store your costumes when they are dirty. Any stains or spotting will clean much easier when done immediately, rather than six months later. Blood and other stains may NOT come out if they sit in the garment for any length of time. Check your costume for any stains before you store it. Always try spot cleaning before trying to clean your performance costumes. To avoid the "ring" around a spot that you have tried to spot clean — "feather" around the spot with a dry towel to draw out the water (or dry cleaning fluid) so that a distinct line will not form. If your costume manufacturer provides a test swatch, test your laundering procedure first, on this swatch. Satin Stitches always provides this test "care" swatch. If this is not an option, test a section of a costume that will not show.

Never store your costumes when they are damp with perspiration. Let them air dry before closing up any storage bag. You may hang the bag around the costume, but don't zip it up, if you think your costume is still damp. Body odor will remain in performance costumes. Air out your costumes after every use, before putting them away. Body fluids and sweat that accumulate in the crotch area of the costume should be hand rinsed out, after every performance and be allowed to dry thoroughly before storing. Always wear panties with a dance costume — even with tights. Just choose a style with no visible panty line.

Deodorizing simply masks body odor with a fragrance.

One idea is to store your costumes with a dryer sheet to mask the odors. But be aware that the dryer sheet will add a fragrance. If you are sensitive to fragrances, do not do this. **Dry cleaning will not take out body odors.** Deodorizing will — but it is simply masking the body odor with a fragrance. Dry cleaners will now only add this if asked, as many customers have allergic reactions to the fragrance. Only consider using a professional dry cleaner if you are sure that they can handle specialty performance costumes. (Maybe only 5% of all dry cleaning establishments CAN.)

NEVER soak a costume. If you determine that hand washing will work — dip the costume, use a mild detergent (dish soap or hand soap will work) and gently rinse. The longer something is immersed in water, the greater the risk for problems.

I highly recommend a product named **Fresh Again**® - it is a spray product that states that it "safely eliminates odor on fabrics." I have personally tested it on ALL types of performance fabrics and trims, with great results. If you are interested in this product, we sell it in our **Web Store** and I have an article that tells how to use it.

Wear underarm dress shields or absorbent pads that will be removed. **Do not sew dress shields into costumes** — the odor stays in the dress shields, and therefore in the costume. Whenever possible, wear a tight cotton T-shirt under your performance costume to soak up perspiration. We suggest a product called **Hollywood Garment Shields** ("pretty underarm protection"), which we sell in our Online Store and can also be found in notions departments of fabric stores.

We always want to keep our clothing fresh, and dance/performance costumes are no exception, even though they are generally much harder to take care of. Common sense and pro-active care will keep your costumes much fresher and help them last much longer.

COSTUME CARE TIP - VODKA & ESSENTIAL OILS

Alcohol is a natural disinfectant. When hand sanitizers came out in all those wonderful scents (taking me back to the '90s), I remember making some of my pre-teen/teen ballet students put a helping under their armpits. It was an experiment that worked and kept me from gagging. And they smelled like raspberries and strawberries! (That's a great tip if you still carry hand sanitizers.)

Vodka has the least amount of color and aroma of alcohols, and kills the bacteria that causes odor. Spraying with a vodka solution helps prolong the life of a costume by reducing the need to clean after each wear. And if you 'partner dance,' your partner is grateful.

Essential oils are also natural disinfectants that kill germs and deodorize. Young Living Essential Oils has 'Purification' - a blend of citronella, rosemary, lemongrass, tea tree, lavandin, and myrtle. If you burn food, or have stinky shoes and workout clothes, diffusing or adding to your wash and wool dryer balls will do the trick ... quickly. There are a lot of varieties of 'Eucalyptus' essential oils (citriodora, globulus, staigeriana, blue-nonallergenic) that are also strong disinfectants, as well as peppermint and tea tree. Consider adding lavender essential oil for a pleasant smell or orange for a bright, pleasant smell.

Here's a spray bottle recipe. Remember to TEST an area for color fastness.

1 part Vodka (cheapest is best), 1 part water, and a few drops of essential oil(s) (depends on the size of your spray bottle). Shake, spray liberally, allow to dry thoroughly.
