

#### John Heginbotham, Choreographer

Originally from Anchorage, Alaska, John Heginbotham graduated from The Juilliard School in 1993, and was a member of Mark Morris Dance Group (1998–2012). In 2011, he founded Dance Heginbotham, a New York-based contemporary dance company that has toured nationally and internationally. Heginbotham is a recipient of the 2018 Guggenheim Fellowship and the 2014 Jacob's Pillow Dance Award.

Sought after as a freelance choreographer, Heginbotham's projects include RACECAR for The Washington Ballet (2019); the Tony Award®-winning revival of Oklahoma!, directed by Daniel Fish (Bard Summerscape, 2015; St.Ann's Warehouse, 2018; Broadway, 2019; National Tour, 2021/22; Young Vic London, 2022); and John Adams's Girls of the Golden West, directed by Peter Sellars (San Francisco Opera, 2017; Dutch National Opera, 2019). Heginbotham is the director of the Dartmouth Dance Ensemble and is a founding teacher of Dance for PD®, an ongoing collaboration between the Mark Morris Dance Group and the Brooklyn Parkinson Group.



#### History of the Arizona Chapter of the National Society of Arts & Letters

NSAL Arizona came to life in 1966 when key community volunteers had a desire to provide financial assistance to promising young artists through scholarships in the artistic disciplines of art, music and literature, and later adding dance, drama, and musical theater. Our first competition was in 1970 in Dance, and our winner that year was Kristine Soleri who went on to dance with the <u>National Ballet</u> of Canada and American Ballet Theatre.

Our national organization was originally founded in Washington, D.C. in 1944 by Mollie Davis Nicholson and Francesca Falk Nielsen to recognize and promote promising young talent in the arts. It now has 18 chapters across the United States.

The organization has had a distinguished history, providing well over \$3,500,000 in awards at the national and chapter levels. The importance and quality of our mission and activities is endorsed by the stellar list of prominent present and past luminaries in the arts who have served on the NSAL National Honors Council. Seven First Ladies have served as Honorary Members.

#### **ARIZONA YOUNG ARTISTS' COMPETITION 2023**



The Arizona Young Artists' Competition, sponsored by the Herberger Theater Center gives young performing artists the opportunity to compete in the disciplines of Modern/Contemporary Dance, Classical Voice, Musical Theatre Voice, and Acting. This competition

enables young Arizona artists to experience the audition process and garner productive feedback and pertinent experience through an adjudication process led by highly esteemed arts professionals.

After initial auditions are completed, four finalists are chosen from each discipline. Then, these artists are given the chance to astonish a panel of respected judges once more and vie for an opportunity to bring home a \$1500 first prize scholarship awarded to the winner of each discipline. The audience have the opportunity to vote on their favorite performer in all four categories to win the People's Choice Award and take home a \$100.00 prize.

This year, the initial auditions occurred on February 20-23, 2023, and the final competition on February 25th at the Herberger Theater Center in Phoenix. Through this competition, four creative youths have emerged as part of the burgeoning creative community in the disciplines of Modern/Contemporary Dance, Classical Voice, Musical Theatre Voice, and Acting.

#### CITY OF TEMPE COMMUNITY ARTS' HIGH SCHOOL DANCE RESIDENCY PROGRAM

The City of Tempe's Community Arts team launched a new High School Dance Residency Program this past fall to bring together professional dance artists and student dancers. Three local professionals (Jemel Marquez, Zakiya Johnson and Zarina Mendoza) were chosen through a panel selection process to fulfill residencies in all six Tempe Union High School District schools. The resident artists taught a day of workshops to all class levels and set a piece of choreography on the advanced class over an extended rehearsal period. The residency culminated in a sold-out showcase on January 17, 2023 at Tempe Center for the Arts. The Dance Tempe: Student & Resident Artist Showcase featured the premiere of the advanced class pieces as well as featured work by the resident artists' professional companies and additional pieces by each high school.

While supporting young dancers as they enter potential careers in dance, this program also fosters local dance educators and professional dance artists in their careers by providing a platform to inspire, share knowledge, create and present work in an esteemed venue.



#### Arizona Dance Education Organization (AzDEO) Honors Teacher



AzDEO is pleased to announce that **Leanne Schmidt Slater**, dance teacher at Shadow Mountain High School in Phoenix, has been awarded the 2023 **Katherine Lindholm Lane Arizona Dance Educator of the Year Award** at the AZ High School Dance Festival on February 20, 2023 at Combs Performing Arts Center in San Tan Valley. Kathy Lindholm Lane was a dance professor at ASU who lost her battle with cancer, and this award pays tribute to the work she did for dance education, honoring dance educators who carry on her work. The award honors a teacher for demonstrating support for and contributing to the larger dance education community, inspiring students and colleagues through example, enthusiasm and encouragement, and advocating for quality dance education and the arts. Leanne truly exemplifies these characteristics in her teaching and by her involvement in the dance community.

#### AzDEO's 37th Annual High School Dance Festival 2023

On February 20, 2023, Arizona Dance Education Organization's 37th High School Dance Festival was held at Combs HS and Performing Arts Center in San Tan Valley. There were 29 schools that participated from around the state. Approximately, 400 students had classes in a variety of dance genres, exposing them to so many of our dance styles. Marquez Johnson taught Jazz, Weezy, Angelo Sapienza and Emmanuel Moore taught Hip Hop, Miranda Manley offered K-pop. Other genres offered included Musical Theater with Shelby Baldwin and Jennifer Seigle, Caribbean Contemporary with Shola K Roberts, Folklorico with Bruno Loya, Contemporary Modern with Leonardo Caudillo, Vogue with Elleanna Spinelli, Bollywood with Kriti Dance, Afro-Latin Salsa with David Olarte, Ballroom with Lane Swenson, Swing with Diona Peltcs, Afro-Brazilian with Melissa Rex, Lyrical with Brandon Lombardo, Ballet with Regina Owens, and Tap with Shelby Baldwin. Bruce Goolsby taught Afro-Fusion and Taprican.

In addition to taking classes, students performed for their peers in two performances. In the morning, while one group of students were taking classes, the other group performed. In the afternoon, this was switched. Students who took classes in the morning, then performed in the afternoon. Students who performed in the morning, then took classes in the afternoon.

Included in our festival is a non-competitive adjudication. Teachers could decide whether they wanted to have their student piece adjudicated and scoring results were mailed to the teacher after the festival. Our goal is to provide a learning experience for students.

Combs HS/Performing Arts Center was an ideal location and students reported having a great time. Our teaching artists support us in our endeavor to provide the variety of classes, and we could not do this without them. We are so grateful for our dance community.



#### **History of the Arizona High School Dance Festival**

The brainchild of a local high school dance teacher, the Arizona State High School Dance Festival began in 1983. A small group of high school dance teachers organized and managed the festival which involved a half day performance by students from a handful of schools. It was free to schools. After a few years, classes for students were added and a small registration was charged to cover teacher fees, facility and production costs. When the Arizona Dance Education Organization (AzDEO) was formed in 2006, AzDEO began providing stronger organizational and financial support, providing a central place for information and a system to track funds. However, the organization and management of the festival remained in teacher volunteer hands; tasks such as securing teachers, hosting, class schedules were divided and coordinated among the volunteer teachers. The festival grew out of a grassroots effort and remains so today.

Over the last 15 years, there have been additions to the festival suggested by teachers and approved by the AzDEO board. Additions include selling festival t-shirts and videos of the performance, vendors, and a non-competitive adjudication for the performance pieces. The festival also includes a teachers' meeting to provide information and networking and to announce the awardees of our two teacher awards.

Profits from the festival fund scholarships to the National Dance Education Organization (NDEO) annual conference.

From the small beginning in 1983, today the festival sees 30-45 schools and 500-650 students in attendance, with about 40-50 teachers attending the teachers' meeting.

Income from the festival varies each year depending on attendance. An average total income is \$9000 (one year our income was \$11000); registration fees: \$6000-7000, Adjudication: 500-550, Video sales: \$500-600, T-shirt sales: \$1500-2000.

Total expenses average between \$7500-\$8500; a couple years we incurred expenses a little over that. The biggest expenses are hiring teachers and facility costs. Today, facility costs range between \$2500-3000. We hire teachers for approximately 32-34 classes with a cost between \$3200 and \$3400. We hire 6 adjudicators with a cost of \$450 plus we buy their lunch (about \$50). The cost for a videographer is about \$500 and the cost of t-shirts is about \$1500-2000 each year. A minor expense is the printing and mailing certificates and having a few plaques made for adjudication results.

What began as a small half-day festival has grown into a multi-faceted full day festival serving large numbers of students and teachers


#### **ASSESSMENT CRITERIA**

- 1. Nominee must be an Arizona resident and United States citizen.
- Excellence of the nominee's significant body of work, covering all aspects of artistic quality, creativity, innovation, and technical mastery.
- 3. Quality and impact of the candidate's lifetime contribution to the development of dance in Arizona.
- 4. Advocacy for the field of dance on a regional and/or statewide level.
- 5. Recognition by peers as an influential figure in their respective dance communities.

**NOTE:** Members of the Arizona Dance Coalition are not eligible to receive an award in any year during which they are actively serving on the Board. No awards will be given posthumously. Awards will be given only to persons who are living on the date the recipients are announced publicly.

#### **Need General Liability Insurance?**

Dance companies, choreographers, and students who present and produce concerts are usually required by the venues to provide **General Liability Insurance** (GLI) / Certificate of Insurance (COI) as part of the facility rental contract. The dance groups or individuals who only present one or two concerts per year may find that the cost of purchasing General Liability Insurance expensive or prohibitive.



## Grants for Arts Projects Deadlines February 9 & July 6, 2023

Grants for Arts Projects is our largest grants program for organizations, providing comprehensive and expansive funding opportunities for communities. Applicants may request cost share/matching grants ranging from \$10,000 to \$100,000.Designated local arts agencies eligible to subgrant may request from \$30,000 to \$150,000 for subgranting programs in the Local Arts Agencies discipline. A minimum cost share/match equal to the grant amount is required.

#### Challenge America Deadline April 27, 2023

Challenge America offers support primarily to small organizations for projects in all artistic disciplines that extend the reach of the arts to groups/communities with rich and dynamic artistic and cultural contributions to share that are underserved. Challenge America features an abbreviated application, a robust structure of technical assistance, and grants for a set amount of \$10,000. Grants require a cost share/match of \$10,000 consisting of cash and/or in-kind contributions. Total project costs must be at least \$20,000 or greater.
